Fort Charlotte, on the Savannah River, the site, not its remains, now under Lake Thurmond, was the last built colonial era fort, intended to protect backcountry settlers. Possessing significant armaments, after surrender to Patriot troops, some were taken to Ninety-Six, whereupon a November 1775 attack resulted in the first South Carolinian casualties.

The reenactment of Fort Charlotte's surrender, working from a script with a narrator, will take place on the 13.5 acres Governor's Green oval on the South Carolina School For Agriculture At John de la Howe (JDLH) campus. The first run will be early following speakers. A 2nd act is under consideration. Duration, including pre-scene: 30+ minutes.

Dr. John de la Howe established residence here in 1774 & tended to wounded Patriot soldiers in August 1776. He was "compelled" to join a Loyalist Regiment in 1782 after claiming British imprisonment twice. His dream upon death was for his Lethe Farm to essentially become what it is today, a unique, year-round agricultural based school.
